
The list, by the way, is an excellent resource, especially if you're trying to get a ski tour or a Tupperware party together.

FIRST SNOW BRINGS FLURRY OF MUTUAL AID

The Veterans' Day weekend brought a major storm to the Sierra and big surprises to a number of hikers and sportsmen caught in the not-unexpected snows.

The main event was the rescue of three backpackers from the Lake Aloha region of Desolation Wilderness. El Dorado County sheriff's deputies called on TNSAR to assist in the search, which was easily accomplished by helicopter in some rather nice weather. As a result of this operation our neighboring county got to know about TNSAR capabilities and promised some return calls should they need a nordic team.

Calls also were received from Washoe and Nevada counties; however, both of these searches were successfully completed without the aid of TNSAR, which was standing by ready to go if necessary.



SUBMIT WITH STYLE

If you shovel snow, remember two rules. One: The snow is bigger than you are—don't try to move it all at once, and don't try to move it too far. Two: The solace of work that is essentially vain, futile, or meaningless is Style—and if you're shoveling snow, then your work is futile, if any work is.

Watch your neighbors, see how they shovel snow. The man you see struggling to pitch an enormous shovel, on which is poised a block of snow the size of a hay-bale, is an amateur. If you're his friend, advise him to take it easy, or to get a snowblower. If you're his life insurance agent, insist. In your own snow-shoveling, use a big shovel by all means, but take small bites. Don't heave the snow out of your path if you can help it; rather, just twist your wrist and let the snow slide off the shovel beside the path. And try to get to your shoveling soon after the snow has stopped falling. The longer you wait, the more time the snow has to settle, increasing its weight and increasing your work.

Try to shovel with style. Reflect that the goal of snow-shoveling is an unsatisfactory one: you will never see the end of it, there will be more snow tomorrow. Still, today's snow must be shoveled. Therefore make the act of shoveling, not the result, the object of your care. Take pains to shovel your paths straight, to make them of uniform breadth, and to cut your corners neat. Take your time. Make unneeded paths, detours, shortcuts, oxbows, dead-ends. If you have animals or small children, they will thank you. And you will have the satisfaction of knowing that you have overcome winter in the only way you ever can—by submitting to it, but gracefully and with style.
