ast season was a banner year for Tahoe Nordic Search and Rescue Team. The Team conducted 12 searches, resulting in the rescue of 17 individuals—all of them alive. Our most successful fundraiser ever, The 26th Great Ski Race, pulled in a record 1022 competitors. And all season long the Team was busy upgrading its communications and rescue equipment, training its members, and educating the public on everything from first aid to snow science.

This all happened under the direction of Team President Joe Pace. Joe earned the role of president three years ago with his backcountry and leadership skills. During those three years, 41 people have been rescued by Tahoe Nordic Search and Rescue Team—no small accomplishment. The Team and the Tahoe community benefited greatly from Joe's tenure as president, and continues to do so. At the May 2002 Team meeting, Joe stepped down from the president's job. He will continue to be an active searcher and Team member. Thanks Joe for all your hard work!

Steve Twomey is the new Team president, and like Joe, the community is lucky to have him at the post As a member of Tahoe Nordic Search and Rescue Team for many years, including six years spent on the Team Board of Directors, Steve's no novice to the Tahoe rescue scene. Steve's presidency promises great things for the NordicTeam's future.

# Summer Search

The Nordic Team was dispatched the afternoon of July 6 to look for Warren Merwin, 64, from Cedar Flat. Warren had left that morning on a walk and had not returned. His family, concerned over Warren's long absence, alerted the Placer County Sheriff's Office.

As the Team was assembling its searchers, Team member Jeff Rieger jumped on his mountain bike and Lance Armstronged up the Tahoe Rim Trail and the area around the Fiberboard Freeway. Rieger, never shy about gleaning information, soon was interviewing everyone he came across on the trail. Many other hikers and bikers had remembered seeing someone of Warren's description, and Rieger began narrowing the search area, radioing the beta to the other searchers. At a little before 5:00 PM Warren was located by searcher Dan Ingalls (Dan was riding his motorbike). He was 1.5 km or so southeast of Martis Peak. Warren was dehydrated from his

long ordeal but otherwise in good shape. The rescue concluded with Placer County's Eagle 1 helicopter evacuating Warren.

Warren's family was especially grateful to all the searchers and the search effort.

This was the Nordic Team's first search and rescue of the 2002/2003 season.

# **Winter Awareness**


During October of 2001, Tahoe Nordic Search and Rescue Team committed itself—and much of its resources—to producing a video on winter awareness. The goal was to bring the message of winter safety to a more diverse and extensive audience, both within the Tahoe Basin and beyond. The Team had mulled over a project like this for more than a decade, but for reasons that had a lot to do with no conspicuous film-making talent among the Team's membership, it never came to fruition.

Enter Bob Wright. Bob, though no filmmaker himself, nonetheless had his sights set high. He figured the time was right to bring the Team's message beyond the local fourth

grade classrooms and target a wider audience. Bob put together a comprehensive plan—including funding—and suggested retaining local film-makers Tom Day, Eric DesLauriers, and Elizabeth Rogers. The trio was subsequently hired by the Nordic Team, and has spent the last year working on the project.

The film, tentatively titled Winter Aware, debuted at the Tahoe International Film Festival on September 25. It's about 40 minutes long.

Tom, Eric, and Elizabeth have done an absolutely outstanding job. The footage is thrilling and inspiring, the music contemporary, and the narration, interviews, and overall message spot-on. The film will appeal to a very wide audience, I believe. But I've always believed myself easier than you have, so check it out

It's always a proper gesture to call the training organizer and let him or her know you will be attending.

October 10: Russ Viehmann (525-6978) will lead a Team truck and equipment training as well as an introduction to the use of avalanche transceivers. Meet at 6:00 PM at the Team garage (223 Fairway Drive, behind the Tahoe City Chevron station).

October 12: A hike from Emerald Bay to Meeks Bay. Meet at the Team garage at 7:00 AM; Steve Twomey (525-7280) is the contact.

October 16: Maestro Randy Sharp (587-2877) will host an evening of instruction on the use of GPS receivers and the Team's computer. Even if you're feeling pretty seasoned with the GPS units, a refresher will imbed that info deep into the long-term. Meet at the garage, 6:30 PM.




